

International Human Rights Law

Faculty: The module is jointly presented by **George Ulrich**, Professor at RGSL (Denmark) and **Arina Melse**, PhD, Visiting Docent at RGSL (Latvia). George is well known to the legal community in Latvia as former RGSL Rector (2009-2016). Before joining RGSL George was





the Secretary General of the European Inter-University Centre for Human Rights and Democratisation (2003-2009), where he currently leads a master's programme in Human Rights and Democratisation. His own research directions include health and human rights, medical ethics, professional ethics, and EU human rights policy and practice.

Arina holds a PhD in public international law from the University of Copenhagen, where she is an affiliated researcher at iCourts The Danish National Research Foundation's Centre of Excellence for International Courts. She is a graduate from the Geneva Academy of International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights of the Graduate Institute Geneva, Leiden University and University of Latvia. She has worked for the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and the International Criminal Court. Arina's fields of competence include civil and political rights, international humanitarian and criminal law.

About the course: The course provides an overview of international and European human rights regimes, including the main standards and protection mechanisms. The course is structured in two parts. The first part introduces UN human rights system and examines the two Covenants and mechanisms for the protection and promotion of human rights. It discusses in detail selected economic, social and cultural rights, such as the right to health, as well as civil and political rights, such as freedom of expression. The second part provides a comprehensive examination of the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR) and its jurisprudence.
